

I believe in making the theater arts accessible to people of all ages and abilities by using ancient storytelling, theater traditions and methods i.e., mime, acting, storytelling, mask making and mask performance, accompanied by live music. For 45 years, I have performed, written about, taught and shared these theater traditions with students and audiences alike.

About Gregson Theater Residencies 1982-Present Day

Barbara L. Gregson of Gregson Theater, directs 10-20 day Theater Residencies in schools, prisons, hospitals, senior citizen centers and community centers, collaborating with people of all ages and abilities since 1982. She creates original theater pieces and productions, often including live original music and masks which culminate in community performances.

She receives Arts in Education and Community Arts grants (DEC and SCR grants) from DE, NJ, PA and NY State Arts Councils, local arts organizations and foundations such as: Earlville Opera House, Chenango Arts Council, Norwich, NY, CNY Arts, Syracuse, NY, Arts Council of the Southern Finger Lakes, Corning, NY and the Leeway Foundation, Philadelphia, PA and PAEP (Philadelphia Arts in Education Partnership) from 1982 to the present day.

Free teen theater workshop at Butternut Valley Arts and Crafts Center this summer

MORRIS — The Butternut Valley Arts and Crafts Center (BVACC), located at 124 Main Street in Morris, will host a free teen theater workshop from August 7 through 12, taught by local artist and thespian Barbara Gregson.

The six-day intensive program is free for all teens going into 7th through 12th grade in the area, with any level of acting or theater experience. Students will learn various aspects of theater, including acting, mime, improvisation, play writing, and crafting a mask using a plaster

cast of their own face.

Classes will be held from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. from August 7 to 11, and 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on August 12.

Gregson said participants will spend the week learning about theater and creating their own show, to be performed for friends

and family at the end of the workshop at 1 p.m. on Saturday, August 12. Her teaching style is based on the commedia dell'arte Renaissance theater training. in which the actor becomes their own mask maker, artist. playwright, storyteller, and performer. The group will draw inspiration from existing stories and stories from the lives of the actors, then using improv to carve out scenes. From there, actors will practice the scenes together, but no scripts are written or used to memorize lines.

"We might take a story, a folk tale for example, and then depending on the group, we will see. We might have some text, some dialogue between some of the characters. We might just have a narrator, and usual-

ly mainly mime and improv," she explained.

"We do improvisations on a scene, and then from that improvisation comes the actual scene that we're going to do. Like they might practice it over and over again and then they'll know what they're doing," she continued. "So it's not like they go home and memorize a script. It's more like you do an improvisation and you figure out what your motivation is, what you're doing in the scene, and you practice it with the other person. You go over it. And we all watch it and sav, okay, that's clear, or no it's not clear so

you guys work on it some more."

She also ensures everyone gets involved in every aspect of creating the show, from set design to crafting scenes to performing.

"When I work with a group, everybody does everything. So if we're going to paint the set, they do it. Everybody," said Gregson. "It's not like, oh, only the artsy kid does the painting. We're all going to make masks, we're all going to work on the show, everybody is in the show, everybody does everything. So that's how I work."

Spaces are still available for local teens to sign up for the six-day workshop, and Gregson recommends signing up as soon as possible.

Gregson said this is the first year the BVACC has received the Artists in the Community grant, and they received the full amount which allowed the program to be free for participating teens. She also said young thespians can expect the program to return in years to come.

Free teen theater workshop at Butternut Valley Arts and **Crafts Center this summer**

MORRIS - The Butternut Valley Arts and Crafts Center (BVACC), located at 124 Main Street in Morris, will host a free teen theater workshop from August 7 through 12, taught by local artist and thespian Barbara Gregson.

Gregson said participants will spend the week learning about theater and creating their own show, to be performed for friends and family at the end of the workshop at 1 p.m. on Saturday, August 12.

Her teaching style is based on the commedia dell'arte Renaissance theater training, in which the actor becomes their own mask maker, artist, playwright, storyteller, and performer. The group will draw inspiration from existing stories and stories from the lives of the actors, then using improv to carve out scenes. From there, actors will practice the scenes together, but no scripts are written or used to memorize lines.

"We might take a story, a folk tale for example, and then depending on the group, we will see. We might have some text, some dialogue between some of the characters. We might just have a narrator, and usually mainly mime and improv," she explained.

"We do improvisations on a scene, and then from that improvisation comes the actual scene that we're going to do. Like they might practice it over and over again and then

Gregson Theater seeking creatives for upcoming canal comedy

CHENANGO COUNTY - Barbara Gregson of the Gregson Theater and local musician Eric Porter are seeking actors, musicians, storytellers, history buffs, and all other creative individuals to join them in their upcoming production of "Minstrels, Trappers, Peddlers, and Pirates Along the Chenango Canal."

The duo crafted an original production last summer, called "The Players and the Pirates Along the Chenango Canal," and are now carrying on the theme in their new show. Taking place in the 1870s, the show will feature characters based on people who actually lived and traveled through Chenango County in that time.

"We will research and find a

variety of characters, which is what we're doing right now," said Gregson. "We went to the Chenango County Historical Society and we looked for what indigenous people were living here. The Oneida people were living here in the 1870s, and we found some Oneida characters that are really cool, that would be traveling along."

"We have a real captain that we're basing this captain on. Captain Nuell Stevers, he was a little kid who grew up on a boat, on the Chenango Canal." she added. "He's a little kid with ten other brothers and sisters, grew up on a boat on the river, and his father was a captain and he was a mule driver. They used to pull the mules to pull the boat on a toe path ... The guy was an incredible character. So he grew up, then he became eventually the captain for many years, and

"Always I've done original work with the group. So I don't come in with a script," Gregson explained. "You write the scene with other people in the show through improvisation. So let's say you're fighting over something, the two

Gregson and Porter have bad guys, and you do it for the group, and then we'll say okay good, go back and work on it some more and do it again. So that way they learn what they're doing, and then they might write it down eventually. So we might have a script at the end." "It's an original produc-

tion, and the script is sort of written along the way,' said Porter. He added that because it's an original piece, they can "adjust the play to accommodate people's talents," or even omit things like lines, should an actor be uncomfortable with speaking in front of a crowd.

ed."

The information session will allow those interested to learn more about the production, and Gregson's creative process when putting together a show.

"Basically show everybody how we work. We'll do a workshop, a theater music workshop, so they'll see. We'll do some theater exercises, games, improvs, and get to know everybody a little. And they'll get all the information, the schedule. They'll get to see how we work," said Gregson.

Rehearsals for the production will begin on July 12 and run through the summer, and end with the performances on August 27 and 28, which will be held at the Chenango Arts Council in Norwich. Schedules will be given out at the information session Wednesday.

The show is made possible through decentralization grants from the Earlville Opera House and the City of Norwich. Gregson said she had received several in 2019 but due to the timing of receiving them, she couldn't use them until now.

"You apply usually around the fall or something like that, it was all different this year, and crazy. And then you hear about it like by December, and then you get your award," she said. "So in 2019 we had applied for a bunch of grants, and we got them all, but that's why we're doing them all now."

"The Players and the Pirates Along the Chenango Canal" will be an original piece. Gregson said it is based off of a Japanese legend.

"It's based on an old Japanese legend, tenth century, of a musician that was sitting in the harbor ... and all of a sudden he's attacked by pirates," she said. "And he says, 'don't kill me yet, just let me play one song.' And of course he plays his beautiful song and they say, 'okay, you'll live.' And they leave him in peace."



The show by the Gregson Theater will follow the legend, but instead of tenth century Japan it will take place along the Chenango Canal in the 1870's.

Gregson said she has always done original works, and that working with Porter allows her to add in original music as well.

"Always I've done original work with the group. So I don't come in with a script. And Eric does original music. He'll find likeis there a band, who plays what, who sings. Okay, let's put together original music that's gonna go with the theater piece, what we're doing. It's really fun. It's the only way I work," said Gregson.

Due to coronavirus concerns, Gregson is asking that only vaccinated individuals participate, to ensure the safety of everyone involved as masks would hinder performance abilities.

"We're saying you need to be vaccinated," said Gregson. "You can't do it in a small group, you can't run around with a mask on doing theater or music or singing."

In addition to creating their own original work, Gregson and Porter will also be doing research with the Chenango County Historical Society to ensure their play is historically accurate.

"It's honoring the forefathers in this area, who built this whole community, the infrastructure," said Porter. "Their way of life and how they coped with life. You know, it's in some ways simpler but in a lot of ways it's different and probably more difficult for them to pull things off."

Cast members are tasked with creating their own characters, said Gregson, but added that there is one character they want to make sure to include in the performance.

"One character that we definitely want to have is a concert pianist from New York City, who's coming by to test out the pianos in the piano factory that was made right here in Norwich," said Gregson. "So you can see imagining a concert pianist traveling by boat to come and check out the pianos for them in there, and he gets attacked."

Gregson and Porter also stressed that the production is a group effort, meaning everyone involved is expected to participate in all facets of putting the show together.

"It's gonna be a collaborative effort," said Porter. "I mean they contribute to the whole production."

Gregson added that, "everybody does everything. That's the thing. Nobody just sits there and does all the acting, and nobody does just the set. Everybody does everything. That's how we do it."

"It's going to be really fun," said Gregson. "Very creative."
